By an act of Congress signed on Aug. 9, 1921 the United States Veterans Bureau was set up as an institution independent of any executive department, with full responsibility for the administration of laws for the relief of disabled veterans. The Bureau has expended about two thousand millions of dollars, and there are charges and counter charges of mismanagement, extravagance, and inefficiency. High officials of the department admit that there is a whirlpool of cross-influences which make esprit de corps, although impossible, and the records are in a chaotic condition.

It is charged that many veterans have been denied relief while others, in some instances, are receiving \$300 to \$400 per month. The vocational training has cost about \$2,400 per man, and the results are said to be more or less a joke. About 25,000 men are receiving medical treatment, of whom 6,000 are surgical cases, 10,000 tubercular cases, and 9,000 neuro-psychiatric cases. About one-fourth of the patients are lodged in private institutions under contract.

The whole matter will probably be thoroughly investigated during the spring and summer, and a general shake-up is promised.

Mr. Bazil Manly, director of the People's Legislative Service, demanded that a Federal Grand Jury should investigate a meeting of three big bank presidents, all of whom had been in Cuba about the middle of January, the result of which was the uncalculated increase in the price of sugar with notice that it would go to 20 cents by June 1st. The National City Bank of New York has 25 branches in Cuba and is said to hold large quantities of sugar paper. President Harding has instructed the department of justice to gather evidence to determine if a criminal conspiracy is responsible for the present fictitious prices. Books of banks, brokerage concerns, and refiners will be examined. There is very little difference between "spicing" from the people in prices of food stuffs, through control of products and "robbing" them by the sale of worthless get-rich-quick stocks. Quick prosecution and prison sentences might serve as a restraint.

The coal industry has been tied up six times in the past 25 years, and in each instance a commission has been appointed to deal with

the situation. Coal consumers have always paid the bill of costs, and then some. The coal industry is a public utility. Either the states or the government should adopt some sane method of insuring continuous functioning—even to the state ownership.
