CHINA WILL PAY BANDIT RANSOM

Shantung Governors to Be Replaced by Strong Military Rule at Once.

Shanghai—The Chinese bandits who held up the Shanghai-Peking express with their feet and captives, including many Americans, have plunged further into the recesses of the mountains of South Shantung and troops, guided to their hiding place by an escaped Chinese, found their quarry there.

Washington—The Peking government has promised to pay the ransom demanded by Chinese bandits who captured American citizens and a number of foreign nationals after wrecking the Shanghai-Peking express, the state department was advised by Joseph G. Shurman, American minister at Peking.

The Chinese prime minister also has agreed to act as rapidly as possible in meeting all demands presented by the foreigner minister at Peking, dean of the diplomatic corps here, and has given assurance that the Peking government intends to demilitarize the civil and military governors of Shantung province.

FIRE DESTROYS MAYO CLINIC

New Structures Near Rochester Burned to Foundations.

Rochester, Minn.—Fire destroyed the new animal experimental laboratory on the estate of Dr. C. H. Mayo, three miles south of here, with a loss of \$100,000. An office building on the estate, which was also in process of construction and a 16-car garage containing one automobile, were also destroyed.

The buildings which burned were not yet occupied, but were to have been put in use next month. A sprinkler system had been installed in all of the burned buildings but the pipes had not yet been connected with the water tower. The buildings were semi-detached construction. The laboratory was one of the largest of its kind in the United States and was to have housed all the departments of animal research of the Mayo clinic and of the Mayo foundation.

MINT LOOT IS RECOVERED

Currency is Held in City Pending Action by Grand Jury.

St. Paul—Approximately \$80,000 in currency, part of the loot stolen during the holdup of the Denver mint, has been recovered in Minneapolis, but has been returned to St. Paul pending action by the government pending action of the federal grand jury in St. Paul next month when it is expected indictments connecting Twin City residents with the Denver mint robbery will be returned.

Secret service operatives who have been active in the Twin Cities since the Denver mint robbery December 19, 1922, when benefits killed Federal Reserve guard and escaped with \$20,000 are credited with the recovery of the \$80,000 and will confer with Fayette French, Jr., United States district attorney, concerning the case before the St. Paul term of United States district court opens.

Indictments Dismissed

Fargo, N. D.—Indictments against the 12 defendants in the Scandinavian-American bank case including A. C. Towley, League of the National Nonpartisan League, William Lemko, S. W. Catro and Credit Director Melner of the Bank of North Dakota, were ordered dismissed in a opinion filed here today by Judge McKenna in district court. The indictments were cancelled and the cases dismissed upon motion of attorneys for the defense who presented 16 grounds for quashing. The decision principally was based on the fact the names of witnesses before the grand jury were not endorsed on the indictments.

It was expected that no appeal would be taken by the state on the general decision, although Attorney General George Shafer indicated he would take time to study the decision before announcing the attitude of his office in respect to further action.

The indictments were returned in May, 1922. The cases came up for trial last November, but a change of venue was obtained and the denuncers to the indictments were filed. The decision of Judge McKenna on the denuncers was filed today and he is expected to file the state appeals—Daily Star.

Contracts have been let, and work started on the new building to be constructed at the Pokegama sanatorium this summer. The building will be 34x155 feet, three story and of the latest fireproof construction. The construction alone will cost about \$75,000. When finally completed and fully equipped and furnished it will represent close to \$100,000.

The building will have the most modern facilities for the treatment of tuberculosis. Terraces for sun treatment will be provided at the south end of the building. The first floor will consist of treatment rooms, laboratories, nurse charge of the sanatorium, has been

THE TONNAGE TAX IS HELD VALID

Revert Means \$5,000,000 Will Flow to State Treasury—To Collect in 30 Days.

St. Paul—Minnesota's occupation tax on the valuation of iron ores mined or produced in that state was declared constitutional and valid by the Supreme court.

Thirty-seven companies comprising nearly all of those engaged in mining iron ore in Minnesota, had attacked the validity of the law in seven cases, and had obtained from the federal district court of Minnesota an order suspending its enforcement. The suits were based on an assertion that the state in the guise of taxes was seeking to exact annually many millions of dollars in a way which was obnoxious to both the Minnesota constitution and the federal constitution, and which deprived the companies of equal protection under the law.

The law was passed in 1921, calling for a 6 per cent gross earnings tax on all ore mined in the state. Two years have elapsed since the passing of this law and as a consequence the mining companies of the state are for that length of time in arrears in their payments.

The tax in 1921 totals approximately \$2,000,000 while the tax for 1922 totals approximately \$2,000,000. Mr. Hines explained.

HUNTED STUDENTS ARRESTED

Mills Arrested at Akron, Ohio—Fisherman Says the Saw Mount Slaying.

Chicago—John A. Strom, a fisherman, told Evanston police he believes he witnessed the slaying of Leighton Mount, Northwestern university freshman, declared to have been killed by hazers. Strom informed Police Chief Charles W. Leungert that he saw young Strom, apparently a student, carry a boy to the lake, duck him, talk of poisoning and in his mouth and then toss him from a pier a short distance from the one where Mount's skeleton was found. This, Strom asserted, was on Sept. 21, 1921, the time of Mount's disappearance immediately after the freshman-sophomore class rush. The police chief declared, however, that he accepted the story with much reservation.

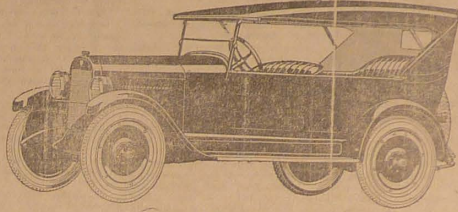

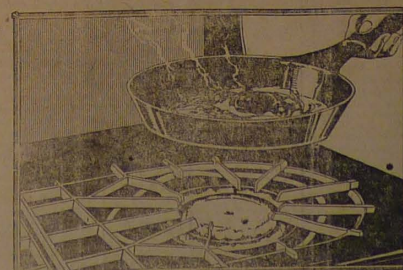

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DAIRY POINTS IMPROVE CAPACITY OF COWS

Testing Associations Aid Dairyman in Culling Out Unfavorable Animals in Herd.

The chief agencies for improving the capacity of dairy cows are the cow testing association and testing for standard registration, according to state dairy extension specialists.

The former aids the farmer-dairyman to raise up his herd, cull out the undesirable animals and get his dairy on a business basis. The testing of purebred cows has produced over 4,000,000 cows and 6,000 bulls have been admitted.

The largest of all the breeds, 90,000 cows and 6,000 bulls have been admitted. Among these animals are 1,000 pounds of butter in one year.

The highest year record for butter is held by May W. O'Connell, who produced 1,022.22 pounds. The cow holding the world's milk record is Selma B. B. Prospect, which in one year produced 4,472 gallons, or an average of over 61 quarts a day.

Good Year if Seen Ahead by Iowa Expert, but Much Depends on Individual Farmer.

From all indications, farmers who milk cows in 1923 have a good year ahead, says C. B. Finley, an Iowa dairy expert. However, profits will depend much upon the individual farmer.

The extent to which it will be possible to cash in on the good year ahead will depend largely upon ten things, which are as follows:

- 1. Get a field of alfalfa or clover large enough to supply the herd.
2. Have ample silage.
3. Feed rations suited to the cows' needs.
4. Weed out the unprofitable cows.
5. Weigh the milk each day.
6. Feed according to production.
7. Make your barn more sanitary and comfortable.
8. Supply the best quality of product to the consumer and the creamery possible.
9. Put your herd on a business basis by being in a cow testing association.
10. Buy stock from good producing purebred ancestry.

BASIS FOR DAIRY INDUSTRY

Don't Wait in Meadows for Cow to Back Up to Be Milked—Waste Converted into Milk.

"Don't sit down in the meadow and wait for the cow to back up to be milked—go after the cow!" The basis for the whole dairy industry is the cow, and if farmers are going to utilize to the best advantage the quantities of roughage that annually are wasted on every farm they must go after the cow.

There is no way to convert the cow, the hay, the clover, the straw, and the abundance of other forage into a marketable form so quickly and so economically as by feeding to the dairy cow. She works day and night, summer and winter, week days and Sundays, in field and stable, and convert the unmarketable waste of the farm into a finished and valuable product of human food.

The first thing is to get the cows. Profits are then assured.

STEADY INCOME FROM DAIRY

Distributes Marketing Throughout Year and Gives Employment in the Dull Months.

The dairy herd returns a constant income to the owner, distributes the marketing period throughout the year, gives employment for the winter months which would otherwise be largely wasted from a productive standpoint, and reduces the crop to their most compact form. If dairying continues to be managed by men of industry and foresight it cannot fail.

ADVANTAGE IN KNOWING COW

Small Breeder is in Better Position to Increase Milk Yield Than Large Owner.

In the matter of knowing the individuality of the cows the small breeder has an advantage over the man with a large herd. The man with 100 or more cannot know his animals so well nor hope to get so much out of them. The old saying "Know thyself" is more excellent than is the one, "Know thy cows."

PLAN TO AVOID DIRTY MILK

Where Cows are Kept Indoors for Greater Part of Day, Pay Attention to Bedding.

Dirty milk is most often caused by the accumulation of dirt on the cow which is confined to the stable for the greater part of the day. While the cows are kept indoors most of the time, more attention should be given to the bedding, and the manure should be removed frequently.

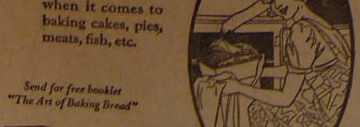

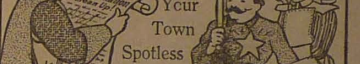
