



### CUT OPERATING TRACTOR COSTS

Much Dependence on Depreciation, Fuel, Repairs and Upkeep, Interest and Lubrication.

### VARIES ON DIFFERENT FARMS

Expense of Operating Three-Plow Machine is Considerably Greater Than for Smaller Implements, but Does More Work.

Every farmer who owns a tractor naturally is interested in the cost of operating his machine and in reducing that cost wherever possible.

Depreciation is wholly dependent upon the length of life and the first cost of the machine. The depreciation costs as determined by the department's investigation are based on a first cost of \$500 and a life of 6.4 years for two-plow machines and of \$800 and seven years for three-plow machines.

### FUEL AND OIL COSTS

Fuel and oil costs are dependent on the amount of work done and while this cost may be large for the season it will not be out of proportion to the work done.

The annual depreciation, repair and interest charges do not increase in proportion to the amount of work done per year, consequently the daily cost of these items will be least for machines which do the greatest amount of work.

Indiana County Agent Uses Figures to Show Farmers Need of Live Stock Improvement.

A census taken by County Agent Watson in Floyd county, Indiana, in 1921, showed that the county had 6377 milk cows, of which 50 were purebred and registered.

### SILVERMINE OAT IS EXTENSIVELY GROWN

Very Popular in Many of the Northern States.

Ranka First in Estimates Made by Department of Agriculture—Red Rustproof, Raised in South, Is Given Second Place.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Silvermine, a midseason white oat very popular in the Northern States, is the variety of oats most extensively grown in the United States, according to estimates made recently by the United States Department of Agriculture in determining the extent and distribution of the different oat varieties.

Red Rustproof, the variety most commonly grown in the Southern States, ranked second with 15.5 per cent of the total acreage, or 6,015,000 acres. Swedish Select, a midseason white variety, introduced by the department, ranked third with 10.1 per cent of the total acreage, or 4,282,000 acres.

### HOW TO CLIP WING OF FOWL

Cornell Experiment Station Outlines Plan for Performing Operation Without Disturbing.

When fowls won't stay inside the fence, wings have to be clipped, to protect the garden and flower beds. The Cornell experiment station has devised the following method of clipping the wing so it will stay clipped without disfiguring the fowl.

Begin by holding the fowl around the second joint. Spread the wing out to its full width and you will see just beneath the skin on the outer edge of the wing a small white ligament or cartilage. Insert a small knife blade under the ligament and cut it in two, pulling upward and outward on the knife. Then cut a piece from the end of the cartilage one-sixteenth of an inch long.

The material is a six-page summary of various plans used successfully in different parts of the country to improve the quality of breeding stock kept on farms.

### DO NOT RAISE DAIRY CALVES

Many Dairymen Prefer to Market Milk on Account of Good Demand—Feed Cost High.

Many dairymen do not raise their better calves because their market for market milk is so good that they do not care to feed with substitutes. Others believe that the cost of feed is so high that it costs more to raise a dairy heifer than her equivalent can be bought for on the open market in another community, where feed and help are lower.

### FEED SILAGE AFTER MILKING

Odor Carried Through Cow Into Milk Very Rarely Causes Butter Unpalatable Taste.

Feed silage or other succulent feed not at shortly before or while milking. The odor is carried through the body of the cow into the milk very rarely and a good proportion of the milk is not affected.

### DAIRY HINTS

GODD FEED FOR DAIRY COWS

Abundance of Pasture Grass Is Best Where Available—Some Grain Often Needed.

A dairy cow will respond to good feeding and good treatment, perhaps better than any other farm animal. Each individual dairy cow should be a unit by herself. Unlike other farm animals, dairy cows cannot be efficiently fed on feed lot, as the requirements for each cow may be different.

The best feed for dairy cows is an abundance of pasture grass when that is available. A good pasture provides a balanced ration. Some high-producing cows will require a little grain as a supplement to pasture.

During the time of the year when a good pasture is not available, a cow can be fed efficiently by providing: 1. An abundance of palatable feed; 2. A balanced ration; 3. A succulent feed; 4. A moderate temperature in barn; 5. Comfortable surroundings.

A dairy cow is fed for the following purposes: 1. For maintaining the body; 2. To supply material for milk; 3. For development of fetus; 4. For growth of animal; 5. For fatness.

A good general rule to use as a guide in feeding is to feed from one-fourth to one-half as much of a balanced grain mixture per day as the cow gives milk per day. Cows giving milk usually give five to ten per day, but need a little more grain in proportion to the milk—A. C. Baer, Professor of Dairying, Oklahoma A. and M. College.

### SIMPLE METHOD TO DEHORN

Easiest Way to Avoid Trouble With Wild Bunch Is to Perform Task While Young.

The easiest way to avoid the expense and trouble of dehorning a bunch of wild and more or less unmanageable young cattle every spring is to do the job while they are baby calves and easily handled.

### TREATING FOR CALF SCOURS

Whenever Indications of Allment Appear Milk Supply Should Be Reduced One-Half.

When a calf shows signs of the scours, the milk supply should be reduced one-half at once and the calf gradually increased as the calf shows signs of improvement. This usually will cure them, but if it does not, the calf should be treated with a strong solution of soluble dried blood.

On this day the survivors of the Grand Army of the Republic will, for the 55th time, gather at the graves of their comrades, and few of them remaining are able to attend to the duties incident to this Decore.

These are the men to whom death had been a constant companion for five years—they had lined with him and sat at his side through long weary months, who he constantly hovered over the hospital couch or the field.

These are the men who were the compound parts of a great episode in history, the factors by which a monstrous war was achieved and won—and a nation saved.

Like the half flags which rest among the choicest treasures of the Grand Army Posts, these men recline in the evening of their days among associations which remind them of their gallant prime.

On Memorial Day 1897, a patriotic group of splendid Southern women gathered at Columbus, Miss., scattered flowers upon the graves of Confederate and Union soldiers alike. This was the inspiration of one of the finest poetic gems in literature of patriotism. It is entitled "The Blue and the Gray," by Francis Miles Finch, and the last couplet is:

No more shall the war cry sever  
 Or the winding rivers be red;  
 They banish our anger forever  
 When they laurel our graves of the dead.  
 Under the sod and the dew,  
 Waiting the judgment day—  
 Under the roses the blue,  
 Under the lilies the gray.

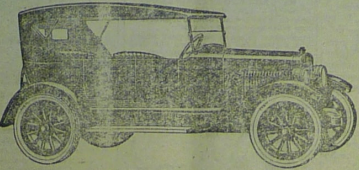

CHICK HAS HARD TIME THE FIRST FEW WEEKS

Old Coccidiosis Lies in Wait and Kills Many Promising Birds

Consider the young chick and the ill which it is to subject the first weeks of its precarious existence. When it would appear that the young bird has about an even chance to pull through, Coccidiosis often comes along and delivers the finishing blow.

No coccidiosis is an infectious disease caused by a minute parasite found chiefly in the soil and in infected pools of water. Birds from two to eight weeks old are most commonly affected.

Because the symptoms are not so specific as they might be, losses from this disease often pass unrecognized or are due to some other cause, says Dr. W. A. Billings, veterinarian with the agricultural extension division service of the university.

However, there is one specific symptom, says Dr. Billings, which gives positive evidence of the presence of the disease—Cathartosis, preference for a bloody diarrhea. Birds so affected appear "droopy"; their feathers are ruffled and present a bedraggled appearance.

"In examining a dead chick note carefully the condition of the intestines," says Dr. Billings. "If they are red or inflamed and the bird is enlarged and filled with a bloody mucus, there can be no doubt of its being coccidiosis. The treatment is relatively simple. Feed very little grain, and no mash. Let the diet consist of some milk or buttermilk. Continue to feed this until the death cause is improved. Improvement is noted. Sour milk has a tendency to cause loose passages, so it is necessary to clean out the floor of the brooder carefully each day.

"It is also good practice to add sufficient potassium permanganate to the drinking water of Minnesota, says that one barberry bush can cause a loss of \$10,000 in a single year, at the same time producing a profit of \$100,000. 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NEW LAW STRENGTHENS COUNTY EXTENSION WORK

State and Federal Aides to County Next Year Will Amount to \$176,000

Counties complying with requirements for the year beginning July 1, 1923, will receive, under the terms of new legislation affecting the county extension service, \$120,000 in state aid and \$56,000 in federal aid, for a total of \$176,000 for the year against \$130,000 for the preceding year.

Summarizing the new law, F. E. Balmer, of University Farm, state leader of county agents, says: "The essential requirement to be met with that the county farm bureau association shall have a membership equal to one-third of the number of farms in the county as determined by the last official state or federal census, provided that in no case shall more than 200 members be required."

Furthermore, preference will be given to those counties where funds needed to supplement federal and state aid are derived from the proceeds of the county farm bureau association, permitting the county farm bureau association to use more of its own resources for the needs of its organization.

Mr. Balmer says the passage of the senate bill and reorganization of the county extension service will make possible a decidedly improved basis for the operation of county co-operative extension work in Minnesota the coming biennium. To Dean W. C. Coffey of the department of agriculture of the University of Minnesota, is credited the general administration of the new act.

The spray mixture for apples and plums best suited to Minnesota conditions is made by adding five quarts of liquid formalin (37 per cent formaldehyde) to 50 gallons of water. The last week of June or the first week of July is the best time to spray and, to round out the season properly, a fourth spray should be given about July 20.
