Magnus Johnson Draws Big Crowd

A crowd of several hundred people gathered in the park last evening to hear Magnus Johnson, Farmer-Labor candidate for United States senator.

The arrangements for the meeting were handled by Mrs. Alex Thiemann, an Attorney S. G. L. Roberts was the chairman of the evening. Those on the platform in Mr. Johnson's party were W. W. Royster and Mr. Freeman. Others on the platform were Mrs. Thiemann, Commissioner Gust Anderson, Mrs. Wm. Duran, Mr. Seilme, member of the Kanabec county board, Chas. Beckman of Rock Creek and Wm. Bernick of Sandstone.

The speaker was introduced by Mr. Roberts was Mr. Royster, who is traveling with Mr. Johnson, representing the organization of railway locomotive engineers. His home is at Glenwood and he has been campaigning for Mr. Johnson since the beginning of the year.

Mr. Royster spoke at length on railway matters and wages of railway men. He also spoke of the sugar trust and similar matters. In closing his address he spoke of Mr. Johnson and of other things that he was desiring to say.

"I have known Mr. Johnson for the past ten years. He is not cultured or educated. He hasn't a college education and doesn't know how to play golf and wouldn't know a golf ball if he saw one. I consider him one of the most intelligent men in Minnesota today."

Mr. Freeman, Mr. Larson's campaign manager, was then introduced by the chairman. He made a short talk in which he outlined briefly the business end of the campaign and announced a collection would be taken up to defray expenses. This was done and a total collection of \$35.85 was reported.

The main speaker of the evening, Magnus Johnson, was then introduced and was given a warm welcome by the large crowd. In opening his address, Mr. Johnson took a line at lawyers in general, in which he said, "The trouble with the lawyers is that they are trying to fill the statute books with laws. They want laws that they can't understand and they pass laws that even the lawyers and the judges can't understand."

He gave considerable time to explaining his side of the much discussed Equity Co-operative loan, and the accusations made of him by Jim Anderson. He told of the numerous senators and congressmen from other states who were sincerely campaigning in his cause and said that Carley, the Democratic nominee, did not know anything about this campaign, that the race was between himself and Governor Press. He touched on two or three national issues and said:

"I am not like my friend Lindberg who favors the re-organization of the Federal Reserve Board. I think it is a fine thing if the right men are appointed to the board. I am for a national bonus for the soldiers. The bonus is paid out of the war profits of the profiteers."

Pine County to Issue \$100,000 Road Bonds for Route No. 23

This month's meeting of the county commissioners is one of the most strenuous they have had, and perhaps one of the most important this year.

The action of most importance to the county as a whole is the passing of a resolution authorizing the issuance of road bonds to the amount of \$100,000. This issue will be made under chapter 520 of the 1923 session laws. It permits any county board to issue bonds for work on trunk roads. The state is to pay the principal and interest up to five per cent.

H. W. Harie and A. E. Eddy of Brook Park and George Empey of Hinckley appeared before the board Tuesday afternoon and requested that these bonds be issued, the money to be used by the state highway department for the construction of Route 23 from the Kanabec county line to Route No. 1. This road comes into Pine county from Mora, runs south of the Great Northern track to a mile north of Brook Park, then due east to the Federal highway, about a half mile south of the Mission Creek bridge.

Mr. Harie in urging the bond issue stated that at present Pine county was getting very little of the automobile tax money, only what is being expended in the upkeep of the Federal road through the county. He mentioned the other county things that have taken advantage of the law and have issued bonds, among them Carlton county. Carlton county sold their bonds last month at 5 per cent plus a premium of \$2750. He said the highway department had agreed to start work on the road as soon as plans and specifications had been prepared. Pine county only loans its credit in the matter as the total collection of \$35.85 was reported.

The main speaker of the evening, Magnus Johnson, was then introduced and was given a warm welcome by the large crowd.

He cited the fact that the township of Brook Park was not receiving a penny of state money for road work, and had never asked the county for any money for road work in that town. Mr. Eddy stated he had interviewed Commissioner Babcock and Engineer Mullins and was told by them that the highway department would approve the bond issue and would start work on the road as soon as possible. Mr. Empey spoke briefly and urged the bond issue.

Engineer Forbes of the state highway department was present and spoke in favor of issuing the bonds, saying the state was responsible for the payment of same under this law and would have complete control and supervision of the work.

After some discussion on the part of the commissioners, a motion to pass the resolution was made by Hancock and seconded by Oakland.

The vote in favor of the resolution was 2 voted in favor and 2 voted against. The motion was declared carried by Chairman Anderson who voted in favor of the bond issue.

DEMAND NEW COMMISSIONER

The opening gun of this session's busy meetings was fired Monday afternoon shortly after the board convened, when Tom Hogan leading a large delegation from district 5 in the eastern part of the county, demanded a new commissioner in their district in place of Frank Thomas.

Mr. Hogan reminded the board of the resolution passed a short time ago by the board, the resolution being to the effect that no money would be spent on any roads in the county other than state roads. Mr. Hogan and a delegation from his district were present at that meeting soliciting money for road work in their towns. After the passage of the resolution they complimented the board on their action and withdrew their request for money.

Mr. Hogan stated that notwithstanding that resolution the board had appropriated \$1000 for Commissioner Hancock's district last month for a road that was not a state aid road. He said that Mr. Thomas had not voted against any on that resolution and therefore was not looking out for the interests of his district. For that reason he said that his delegation was then demanding either the withdrawal of the appropriation for Hancock or a like amount for their district.

Chairman Anderson and Oakland told Mr. Hogan that the \$1000 was not a new appropriation but was part of the \$6000 appropriated for Mr. Hancock last year. Com. Stepan denied this and said the \$6000 appropriation had all been used up.

A few minutes were then taken by Messrs. Hancock and Stepan in complimenting each other on how lit they each one knew. After personalities had been indulged in freely, Stepan moved to rescind the appropriation. Hancock told him his making such a motion was out of order as he had voted against the appropriation in the first place. The motion was then made by Thomas and supported by Oakland and passed with Hancock voting against. Hancock stated he only wanted \$250 of the thousand that made no difference as the whole amount was withdrawn by the motion.

Mr. Oakland then told Mr. Hogan that he could not ask for more money if they so wished. Mr. Hogan replied that his delegation was asking for any in view of the facts. He then asked the board what they were going to do regarding the request for a new commissioner. He was told they could do nothing as Mr. Thomas could legally hold his office until his term expired.

When the county was redistricted last year the town of Winton was where Mr. Thomas resides, was left out of No. 5. This was the request of the taxpayers in the eastern part of the county. They told the board that

it would be agreeable to them to have Mr. Thomas represent the fifth district until his term expired. Mr. Thomas could do that anyway as the state supreme court has held that a commissioner shall finish his term even though the boundary lines of his district be changed and he not reside in the new district.

When the board would take no action in the matter, the delegation withdrew and held a meeting on the court yard lawn. A chairman, secretary and assistant was elected and it was voted to call a meeting of chairmen of the town boards in the fifth district with a view of devising a way to get a new commissioner.

We don't blame our friends from the eastern part of the county in wanting some road work done in their district. They have a perfect right to come to the meetings and insist that they be given their share of the county road and bridge funds. They have to pay their taxes and they have the same rights as any other taxpayer and should be given assistance if all possible as the poor condition of the roads in their district is a well known fact.

We do think they are a little harsh on Mr. Thomas. They agreed to let him finish his term unmolested, which he can legally do. SLAYER KILLED BY SHERIFF AND AIDS

All Night Chase Made for Murderer, Shot Down After Pitched Battle With Sheriff

Cambridge, Minn.—John Sjoberg was shot dead, riddled by a fusillade from a sheriff's posse, 10 hours after he had murdered Andrew Newman.

The murder occurred at the Hildar Hildar farm a few miles out of Dabno, Wis. as shown here.

Hildar Hildar, according to the sheriff and his deputies, is related to Claus Hildar, convicted of the murder of Catherine Berg in the famous Harry Hayward case. Hildar was sent to the penitentiary and Hayward was hung.

Sjoberg fled to the nearby woods and hid. He was beaten out of cover by Sheriff Claus Johnson of Cambridge, and two deputies. A gun battle followed, several shots from Sjoberg's revolver hitting the posse's. Sjoberg finally fell fighting, literally riddled with bullets from the guns of the sheriff and his aids.

The shooting and killing of Newman followed an altercation between him and Sjoberg and a relative, Dan Anderson, were walking by the Hildar farm on their way from Dabno.

ARMAMENT PACT IS ADOPTED

Brian Dated in Speeding Passage of Washington Treaty.

Paris—That part of the Washington treaty dealing with limitation of armaments and capital ships, which created the most bitter opposition in French parliamentary and political circles during the last year, was jammed through the French Chamber of Deputies in record time by the Poincare-Brian alliance. The half-hearted opposition from the Socialists and Communists was swamped and the treaty was adopted, 460 votes to 108.

Arguments employed by Premier Poincare and former Premier Brian held had been treated very differently at Washington.

That limitation of armaments was temporary, so far as capital ships were concerned, that there was complete liberty of action by France in the building of light cruisers, torpedo boats, destroyers and submarines.

MARINES SET FLYING RECORD

Come From Quantico, Va., in 13 Hours, With Four Stops.

Minneapolis—Flying from Quantico, Va., to Minneapolis in 13 hours and 15 minutes, after making four stops en route was the record made by Captain R. A. Presley of the marine corps and his mechanic, Sergeant Drapo.

The aviators flew here to attend the dedication of the Volk-Chamberlain Field near St. Paul.

The trip was made in a Vought experimental plane, known as army and navy circles as a "V-5". The pair left Quantico at 4:30 a. m. and arrived at Speedway field at 5:45 p. m. The cruising speed of the trip was given as 95 miles an hour for the estimated distance of 1200 miles, and the top speed was 120 miles an hour. The plane was equipped with a 150-horse power Hispano-Suiza motor, commonly called the "Hisso."

FORMER JUSTICE DAY DIES

Member of U. S. Supreme Bench Succumbs at Mackinac Island.

Cleveland, Ohio—Former Justice William R. Day of the United States Supreme court died at his summer home at Mackinac Island, Mich. Death was caused by chronic bronchitis. Justice Day was 74 years old.

Funeral services will be held at his tower home at Canton, Ohio.

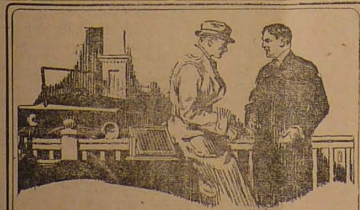

Further Exposures of How Edison-Ford Money Plan Would Fall to Aid Farmer.

The way the Edison-Ford "commodity money" scheme, aimed to stabilize monetary values, would have exactly the opposite effect, is discussed in the present article, which is the second in a series prepared by the American Bankers Association, reviewing the exposure of the weakness of the plan as presented by William T. Foster, Director of the Pollock Foundation for Economic Research.

Briefly stated, the Edison-Ford plan provides for Government warehousing of basic commodities, against which currency would be loaned to the producer without interest, up to half the average value of the products for the previous twenty-five years. This currency would be cancelled as the commodities were withdrawn and passed into trade. On the other half of the value the producer would receive "equity certificates" which he could sell or use for bank loans. On these points Mr. Foster says:

Upsetting Price Equilibrium
"Steady price levels depend mainly on the balance between the volume of goods on the market and the amount of money offered for goods. The Edison plan is designed expressly to upset this balance. A farmer delivers, say, two thousand bushels of wheat to the Government warehouse and the Government delivers one thousand dollars in new money to the farmer. When the farmer sells the wheat he repays the loan and the Government destroys the money. Thus the volume of money is increased precisely when goods are stored; and the volume of money is decreased precisely when these goods are marketed. In other words, each transaction begins by placing in circulation goods without money to match the goods. Dollar demand is created as the supply of goods is withdrawn; the supply of goods is created as dollar demand is withdrawn."

"Would it enable the farmer to borrow more money on his products than he can now borrow? When Mr. Edison contends that farmers would obtain larger loans on their crops than they can now obtain from banks, he is confronted by this dilemma: Either the banks are now refusing to make sound loans, or, under the Edison plan, the Government would make unsound loans. "Neither Mr. Edison nor Mr. Ford can consistently contend that banks now refuse to make sound loans, for that is the way banks make most of their profits, and Mr. Edison and Mr. Ford have no doubt that banks are conducted for profit. It follows that the plan would yield larger loans to farmers only if the Government met the risks of unsound banking. In that case all that insolvent borrowers gained would be paid by the rest of the population, which, to say the least, is not a fair deal."

Cutting Down Farm Credit
"Apparently, however, the Government is not expected to run any risks, for the farmer is allowed to borrow an amount no greater than one-half the average value of his product for the previous twenty-five years. But prices have risen so high since 1898 that the farmer could borrow on most products much less than half the present value of the products. It would be much less, therefore, than the farmer could borrow directly from the banks on graded products. On products not graded, no Government loans would be made, for there would be no way of determining the twenty-five-year price average. "However, the farmer, having obtained the stipulated Government loan on his goods, could then offer his equity certificate to a bank for an additional loan. But the equity certificate is virtually a second mortgage, and so bank would prefer a second mortgage to a first mortgage."

"Suppose the Old National Bank was willing to lend a farmer eight hundred dollars on one thousand bushels of wheat. Suppose, however, the farmer deposited the wheat in a Federal warehouse and obtained five hundred dollars from the Government. Certainly the bank would not lend the farmer three hundred dollars on the equity certificate. The price of the bank would be greater if the farmer relied on the bank for the entire loan; for if that case the bank could realize on its security without being obliged to pay five hundred dollars to get the wheat out of Government storage. The farmer can now borrow more money from a bank on standardized farm products than under the Edison plan."

GETTING TOGETHER

"The earth and the fulness there of" is the primary source of capital. The farmer, therefore, is the nation's greatest producer of wealth. Farming and banking—production and distribution—should go hand in hand. The problems of the farmer are the problems of the banker. Both are vitally concerned in bringing about a proper adjustment of transportation and marketing costs. The increasing tendency toward a more sympathetic understanding of each other's relation to these problems is one of the very encouraging signs of the times and will result in further advancement of their mutual interests.—Walter W. Head, First Vice President American Bankers Association.

EARTH'S SURFACE ADRIPT, BELIEF OF SCIENTISTS

Theories of German Savant Arouse New Controversy.

London.—An interesting controversy has been excited by the remarkable theories of Prof. Alfred Wegener, a German, who declares that the earth's continents are drifting westward. His thesis is that the earth's continents are of lighter material, and that like icebergs on a heavier plastic material, which reaches its highest level at the bottom of the oceans.

This startling theory has been strongly criticized by F. Lake of the Royal Geographical society. By means of maps he showed the way in which Wegener has reconstructed the world's surface of the globe. According to his reconstruction North America was once in physical contact with Europe; India fitted in between Africa and Australia and South America was brought into contact with Africa. Since then the continents have drifted away from one another into their present position.

Among a number of carefully reasoned criticisms Mr. Lake pointed out that in order to meet his theory Wegener had fattened out the Himalayas in order to lengthen the peninsula of India, but he had not fattened out in a similar way. He also declared that the argument based on alleged correspondence between the world's mountains in the various continents would not hold good, because Wegener's geological facts were not accurate.

As an offset to Mr. Lake's views, a number of other British observers seem inclined to support Wegener's revolutionary theory. Prof. J. Joly of Trinity college, Dublin, writing in the current issue of Nature, thinks that Wegener is in error in working out the theory on the basis of a westerly drift of the continents. The theory, he says, grows in probability if an easterly drift is indicated.

Rare Brand of Pigeon.

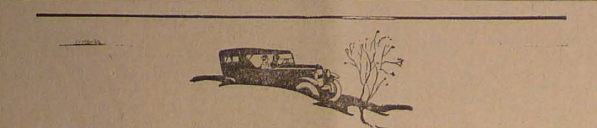

Some Little Known Facts About Minnesota's Best Known Public Man

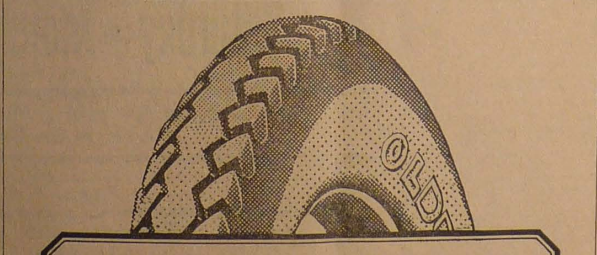

IN THE PUBLIC EYE

Holds the Record for Decorations

When Secretary of War Weeks pinned on his breast the Distinguished Service Medal, Maj. Edgar Reekie Hume, U. S. A., must have become the most decorated man in the United States army. His collection of war medals now numbers 28, and he has earned them all by his bravery while exposed to gas and to the danger of contracting the deadly disease against which he worked.

For a time during the World War Major Hume was stationed on the Italian front. Later he was sent to Siberia, where he organized the American sanitary service and combated the deadly typhus fever which was rife there. As evidence of the danger of his work and the value of his services as a physician it was pointed out in the War department's citation that 80 per cent of Siberia's doctors had been killed by the fever.

The following nations have joined in the tribute of awarding Major Hume various decorations: United States, 1; Siberia, 3; Russia, 2; Montenegro, 2; Greece, 4; Poland, 1; Rumania, 3; Panama, 1; Italy, 6; Czechoslovakia, 1; Great Britain, 1 and France, 1.



Says He Was a Victim of "Black Art"



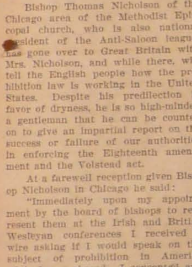
Charles B. Manville of New York, wealthy nonconformist asbestos manufacturer, lost the \$25,000 suit brought against him by Dr. Alton B. Austin, but still clings to his story that his counter claim for \$25,000 was valid because Dr. Austin induced him to invest in worthless oil stock, with the aid of a "black art" practitioner, who turned out at the trial to be a spiritualist medium. His attorney characterized him as a "rich old man whose money the gang was after."

On the stand Manville testified that Dr. Austin persuaded him to visit with the Illinois spiritualist, telling him she was a wonderful woman and urging him to ask her questions.

"I asked, 'Is this spiritualism?'" Manville testified, "and she said, 'No, this is black art.' Then she told me a lot about my private family affairs, and I was having some unpleasantness with my children. I didn't know anyone outside of my family knew about this, and I asked Austin what he had told her about me. He said 'Not a thing.'"

"I asked him what she charged and he said 'Nothing, she takes whatever you like to give her.' Then he told me that Mr. Tiffany, Mr. Schwab and other big men went to her for business advice once a week. I gave her a ten-dollar bill."

To Tell England About Prohibition



Bishop Thomas Nicholson of the Chicago area of the Methodist Episcopal church, who is also national president of the Anti-Saloon league, is to go over to Great Britain with Mrs. Nicholson, and while there, will tell the English people how the prohibition law is working in the United States. Despite his proclivities in favor of dryness, he is a high-minded gentleman, that he can be counted on to give an impartial report on the success or failure of our authorities in enforcing the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act.

At a farewell reception given Bishop Nicholson in Chicago he said: "Immediately upon my appointment by the board of bishops to represent them at the Irish and British Wesleyan conferences I received a wire asking if I would speak on the subject of prohibition in America while I was abroad. I consented and have taken pains to arrange myself to do so. I was born in Woodburn, Ontario, in 1862, and received his collegiate education in Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill."

Helped the Italian Women Get Suffrage

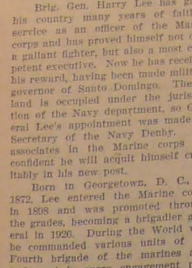


Premier Mussolini, having been induced to abandon his opposition to universal suffrage, Italy has granted to women the right to vote and to hold office with certain restrictions. It may well be that this result was brought about largely by the holding of this year's convention of the International Women Suffrage alliance in Rome. Delegates from nearly every country on the globe were present at the gathering and they displayed an earnestness and enthusiasm that could not but have its influence on the premier and leader of the Fascists.

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt of the United States (portrait herewith), president of the alliance, presided over the session and was, as always, one of the most active participants in the discussions. However, she refused to stand for re-election as head of the great organization.

The alliance determined to carry on a vigorous campaign to remove glaring inequalities between men and women workers.

Harry Lee Now Rules Santo Domingo



Brig. Gen. Harry Lee has given his country many years of faithful service as an officer of the Marine corps and has proved himself not only a gallant fighter, but also a most competent executive. Now he has received his reward, having been made military governor of Santo Domingo. The island is occupied under the jurisdiction of the Navy department, so General Lee's appointment was made by the Secretary of the Navy. His associates in the Marine corps are confident he will acquit himself creditably in his new post.

Born in Georgetown, D. C., in 1862, Lee entered the Marine corps in 1888 and was promoted through the grades, becoming a brigadier general in 1920. During the World War he commanded various units of the Fourth brigade of the marines and took part in every engagement participated in by that famous fighting force, including the Chateau Thierry, Soissons, Marbache sector, St. Mihiel, Blanc Mont and Meuse-Argonne operations.

SANDWICH SUGGESTIONS

A sweet sandwich takes the place of cake and is much more wholesome for a child's lunch than cake and smooth cream. The following may be helpful:

Apple-Ginger Sandwiches—Chop a handful of dates and add cleaned, preserved ginger and the ginger syrup to taste; add a bit of lemon juice and stir until well over; add a thin slice of bread spread on this slice of bread well buttered.

Raisin and Peanut Sandwiches—Put a cupful of seeded raisins through a food chopper, add one cupful of peanut butter and a little cream. Spread on buttered slices of whole wheat bread.

Raspberry Jam Sandwiches—Cut sponge cake in thin slices. Put together with raspberry jam or blackberry jam. Cut in rounds or triangles.

Orange Marmalade Sandwiches—Beat cream cheese with a little softened butter or thick cream until smooth. Spread on buttered slices of bread, spread with the orange marmalade.

Orange Sandwiches—Take two tablespoons of orange juice, one teaspoonful of lemon juice and one cupful of confectioner's sugar; beat until smooth. Butter wafers or crisp in the oven and cool; spread with the filling, sandwiched fashion.

Sandwich Filling—Finely chop dried, cracked eggs; to each egg add three olives, one-half of a cupful of raisins. Moisten well with salad dressing and spread on buttered bread.

Radish Sandwiches—Slice firm radishes in very thin slices and cover with French dressing. Let them stand for 10 to 15 minutes, drain and place them on buttered bread, cover with another slice. The sandwiches may be open if desired, adding a bit of minced green pepper and cream cheese to a garnish. The cheese, if softened with cream, may be piped on in any design with a pastry tube.
