

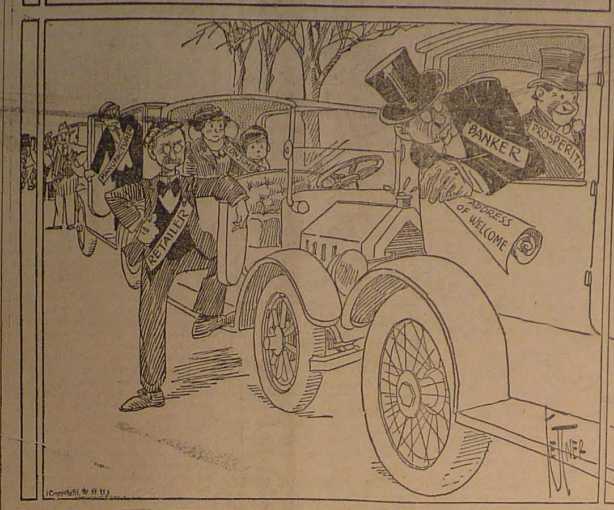

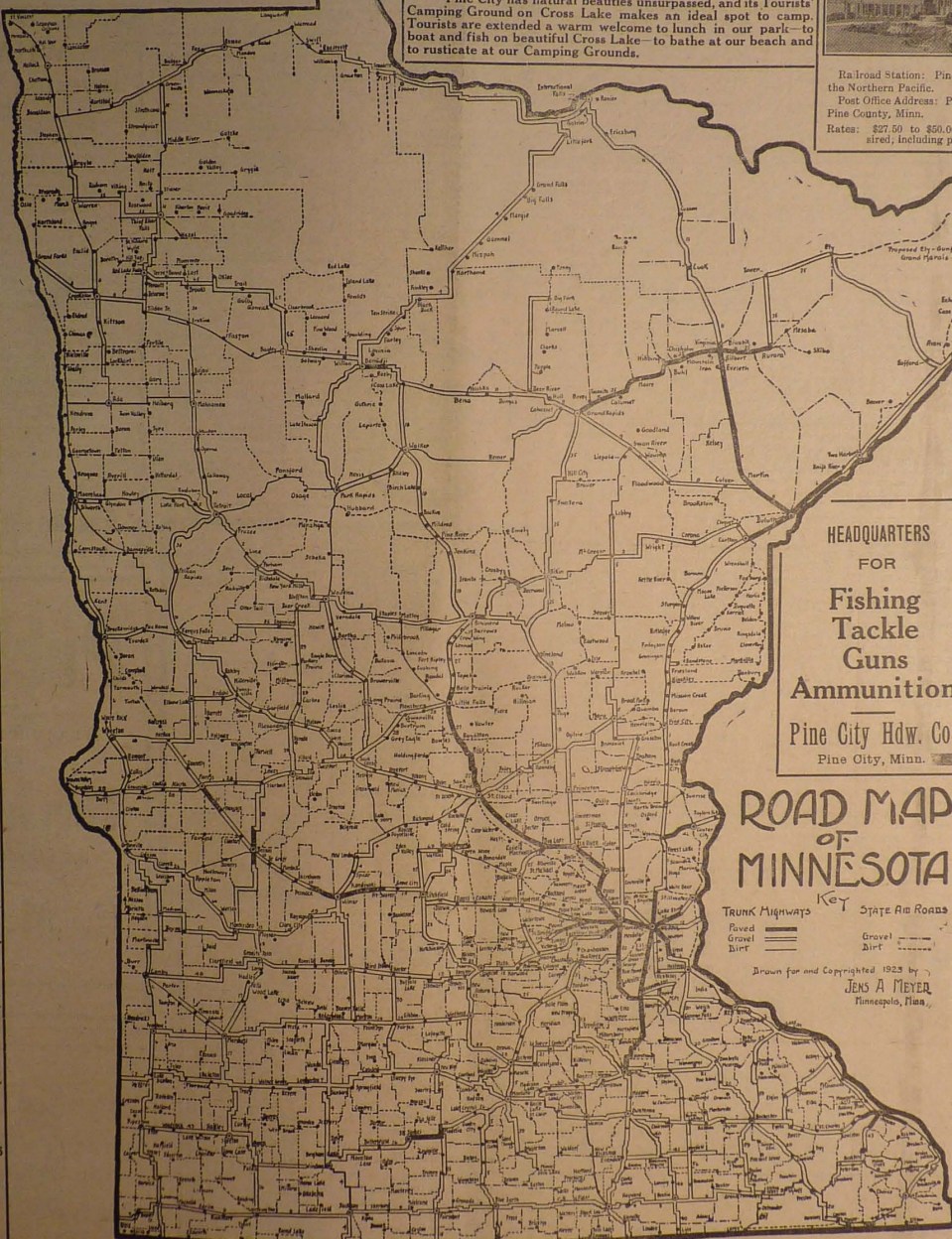

**JAPAN'S DISASTER
HAS ITS LESSON**

The history of Japan is a history of earthquake disasters, but this last upheaval of mother earth surpasses all authentic calamities in the world's history. The disaster has its lesson and ought to have its effect on humanity the world over—not merely the expression of sympathy through liberal giving of money, material and food, but in the fact that there is a power that holds all life and all property within its grasp—a power that permits us to live a little while but does not permit us to take with us a blade of grass, nor a grain of sand from the sea shore when our time is up. Surveying the earth from an adjoining planet, we look upon a distracting condition. Men just recovering from a war in which the loss of half a million lives was an incident, are preparing other wars and other disasters to make the loss of life and property in Japan seem trifling. They push and crowd and jostle and juggle and kill each other—for what? A few paltry dollars! Horrible as this disaster is it is slight when compared with the marauding and the bloodshed of the world in 1914, resulting in the killing of forty millions of men, the flower of the world. This Japanese horror might be a blessing if it would make men realize that they are all brothers—children of a universal father, and their mission on earth is not to butcher and rob each other. Whatever our opinion of the Japanese, whatever barriers there may have been, they are all swept away, and the Pacific, from an ocean of strategy and war maneuvers, has become a highway across which the friendship of a kindly world will flow. World that it might lay a nation together with a bigger, broader, better understanding of the brotherhood of man.

The Railway Age objects to labor representation at the conference on railway valuations for the reason that "none of them pay freight charges to the railroads." That statement contains an essence of the hostility between Capital and Labor. Capital contends that Labor does not "pay" the freight charges, but Labor contends that it pays all the freight in the end. Freight cost is added to almost everything contributing to life—houses, clothes, food, materials, jewelry and coal. Freight rates are like taxes—the renter pays the taxes as well as the freight and he who works and lives pays his portion of the freight. Inasmuch as 45 percent of the population of this nation are working people, and therefore pay nearly all the freight, they certainly are entitled to a fair representation and hearing.

112 ALIENS TO BE DEPORTED
14 Women, 10 Children Included in Group Reaching Ellis Island.
New York—Caught in a nation-wide roundup of undesirable aliens, 112 deportees arrived from the West and were taken to Ellis Island. Among those scheduled for deportation were 14 women and ten children. There were also 80 insane persons and 29 criminals. Most of the undesirable were from Portland, Ore., Seattle and Spokane.

As the special train moved eastward others sailed in the rounds were taken on from Kansas City, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Chicago, Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

There were but few revolutionaries or extremists in the party, officials said. Most of the women and children were forced to accept deportation or separation from their husbands or fathers.

**FARMER-BANKER CONFERENCES
THROUGHOUT NATION DEVELOP
WAYS TO AID AGRICULTURE**

Collective Marketing, Diversified Farming, Promotion of Agricultural Education and Use of Bank Instead of Mercantile Credits Chief Lines of Suggested Action.

Four lines of action to improve the business of farming stand out in the discussions that have occurred at a series of farmer-banker conferences now being held throughout the United States. They are collective marketing, diversified farming, the promotion of agricultural education and the use of the more economical bank credit rather than mercantile credit. At many points active steps to improve along these lines have been taken.

The conferences were initiated by the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, and that the condition of the man on the farm is improved. This first conference was held in conjunction with the Wisconsin College of Agriculture at Madison. An important program that the Commission was established at this meeting in the form of cooperation with the agricultural colleges.

In five other states—California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Utah—it was agreed at subsequent conferences that bank committees would meet at the state agricultural colleges and, in cooperation with the college officials, work out a system of collective, orderly marketing that they would recommend to the banks.

The Texas Plan
It was at the Texas conference that it was developed that the officials of both the bankers' association and of the state college felt the big problem for that state was the establishment of a system of collective, orderly marketing. In order to bring this problem effectively before the farmers and the bankers it was agreed to hold a farmer-banker meeting in December. Efforts will be made to get from 200 to 250 bankers to attend, each banker to bring with him several representative farmers of his community. The program and demonstration will center about the need of meeting the marketing problem and point ways to a satisfactory solution.

At Athens, Georgia, the conference recommended that the State Bankers' Association take steps to raise a fund for assisting deserving students to complete a college course in agriculture or home economics. This conference, recognizing the valuable work being done by county agricultural agents and home demonstration agents, also went on record as favoring the employment of agents in each county to practice greater crop diversification. The conference felt that the first big step was to get farmers at least to produce sufficient vegetables, fruit, milk, meat and poultry to live on.

Santo Domingo's Sad Story
When Columbus first landed on Santo Domingo the native population numbered, according to the lowest estimate, 1,000,000 souls. Fifteen years later the number had fallen to less than 60,000, says the Detroit News.

At Raleigh, North Carolina, conference for educating the farmer in regard to the importance and the economy of bank credit over mercantile credit. The emphasis on this resolution came not so much from the bankers present as it did from the representatives of the agricultural colleges and the farmers.

LOST FIRST CARGO OF ICE

Frederick Tudor Proposed to Ship Ice From Boston to West Indies in 1805.

When twenty-two-year-old Frederick Tudor proposed to ship ice to the West Indies from his father's pond in Saugus, Boston thought him mad, and snarling men, fearing the cargo would melt and swamp a vessel with difficulty were persuaded to handle his bid, says "Maritime History of Massachusetts." His first venture was 130 tons of ice to Martinique in 1805. On receiving news of its complete failure, he wrote in his journal: "He who gives back at the first rebuff and without striking the second blow, depicts of success has never been, is not and never will be a hero in love, war or business."

By 1812 Tudor had built up a small trade with the West Indies. The war wiped him out. After the peace of Ghent he obtained government permission to build ice houses at Kingston and Havana, with a monopoly of the traffic. It began to pay, and between 1817 and 1820 he extended the business to Charleston, Savannah and New Orleans.

Vessels had to be double sheathed to protect the ice from melting, and the captains had to be cautioned, with wearisome repetition, never to let the hatches be removed. Tudor experimented with all sorts of filling, with rice and wheat chaff, hay, tanbark and even coal dust before he settled upon pine sawdust as the best insulator.

HEROISM OF AFRICAN CAT

Missionary Tells How Mother Feline Saves Her Kittens in Fierce Hall Storm.

A missionary to Africa tells this interesting story of the unusual heroism of a cat he once owned.

One day a terrible hall storm came, the sort concerning which English and American people know nothing. In a quarter of an hour hail covered the ground to a depth of two feet. Before the storm began the missionary's three cats were outside playing; they were all mother cats and had their kittens with them.

Immediately two of the mother cats ran to shelter, never troubling about the little ones, but the heroine of the story stood her ground. As soon as her master managed to go to her he found that she had gathered not only herself but all her kittens under her own four blades, but all the others as well, nine in all, and had stood over them, keeping them warm and safe, while she also was nearly frozen. 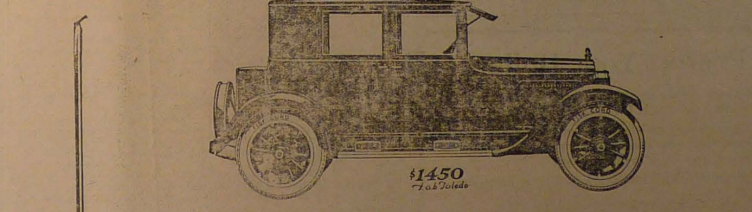
